4. I complained that they purposely detained the return of my motor cycle using pathetic excuses changing by the minute as each excuse was ridiculed by me and that they purposely took parts from the motor cycle that have not yet been returned.

Under Article 6 of the European Charter of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedom I was entitled to a number of things listed above.

Your reply to my applications to intervene in the above matters was that you had no power to order the prosecution to abide by the European Charter.

Dear Madam

Further to your letter of 6 September 1993 the Magistrates heard a representative for the police tell them the police had failed to identify me thereby requiring custody in prison.

I told the Magistrates that my name and address was written on the custody sheet and that the contents of my pockets, examined in front of me by the police, contained letters from my bank and Borough Council, drugs, syringes, needles, cheques made out to Animal Health Centres at Barry, Llântwit Major and Ely and that my motor cycle in their custody further assisted my identification.

I addressed the magistrates for fifteen minutes on the court clock giving every conceivable way they could identify me as a practising veterinary surgeon, employing eleven staff with three surgeries and four private residences.

I asked them to look at the custody sheet where they could read that upon my arrest I notified the duty solicitor, demanded a tape recording of my statement and that Inspector Trigg of Barry Police Station was to be contacted immediately as I had just left Barry Police Station serving a letter of complaint to do with police harassment on the road. There are other matters that were

There is still the charge of possessing an offensive weapon (one of two similar charges) that has not been withdrawn with the other three charges. What are you doing about it? I need a copy of the charges and court procedure documented that were before those Magistrates.

Your delay is to obstruct justice (Article 6, European Charter).

VENDETTA CLAIM BY BIKE-MAD VET

A MOTORBIKING vet who once appeared in court in a Nazi uniform has accused police of a 15-year-vendetta, after his "arrest" outside his Cardiff surgery.

He made his claims after charges of resisting arrest and carrying an offensive weapon were dropped at Cardiff magistrates court.

Mr Maurice Kirk (BVSc, MRCVS) who runs the Animal Health Centre in Grand Avenue, Ely, claims he was targeted when a Bristol court cleared him of "stealing a chief superintendent's notebook".

And he claimed the "so-called" offensive weapon was a simple bit of wire used for "denorning the Prince of Wales's cattle at his Boverton farm".

The 48-year-old was arrested last May outside his Ely surgery and held for four days pending inquiries into his identity.

Police who wanted to question him claimed he refused to confirm his name and address and had assaulted an officer.

"They knew full well who I was — there were people there saying he's our vet," said Mr Kirk.

The leather-wearing bike-rider, who raced in "Mad Sunday" in the Isle of Man TT, once wore a Nazi uniform when summoned to court in Guernsey. 4/3/93 FNO
